Pupils in forms I, II and III enjoyed a funpacked day at Park Hall Farm, experiencing country life today and a long time ago. We started the day going back to the Iron Age, sitting in a round house finding out about daily life and having a go at weaving with wool and grinding wheat using large stones. After lunch the children had a tractor ride around the farm before meeting the cows in the milking parlour and learning how to look after smaller farm animals and pets. The day was rounded off by cheering on the racing pigs and a play in the adventure playground.











#### More Colours

To further the theme of Joseph's coloured coat, children have prepared assemblies all about colour. This half term we enjoyed Form II sharing their knowledge about flags of the British Isles; Form III presented the story of Elmer the Elephant -Elmer wanted to be grey like all the other elephants, but the other elephants missed his lively and colourful character; and Kindergarten skipped and danced with their colourful ribbons and sang 'I can sing a Rainbow!'
