#### Breaking All Records!

It has been a record breaking year for Form VII in their secondary school entrance examinations. The results so far are proving to be outstanding.

Adding to the 12 places offered by the Wirral Grammar Schools from earlier examinations, a further 14 places, including no less than 8 academic scholarships, have been offered by Ruthin school.

A 100% pass rate has been achieved at both King's and Queen's Schools, with one Entrance Scholarship award for King's, and a triple academic, art and music scholarship has been offered by Moreton Hall.

Entrance and scholarship exams for St Brigid's and Rydal Penrhos have been taken and the results are eagerly awaited. In addition to academic scholarships, a number of our extremely talented children have entered for art, music, sport and drama awards.


This has been a fantastic effort by all and a huge vote of thanks goes to Mrs. Hall for guiding everyone through the examination process!

#### Neat Moves in 'Alice' Auditions

This half term we have started working towards our next musical show, "Through the Looking Glass". Each of the classes have begun reading a version of the story and the music and drama departments have been working hard in preparation for the main event.

Lewis Carroll's work, based around a game of chess, is enthralling many of the children — the younger children enjoying the variety of characters from Humpty Dumpty and the talking flowers to the monster, scary Jabberwocky, and the older children hopefully appreciating the humour within a vast array of wordplay, puns and nonsense.

We were amazed by the outstanding interest shown at auditions held over the last two weeks. The emerging talent in all classes allowed to take part, from Form V to Form VII, was very much in evidence. Children showed extreme enthusiasm in both serious and comic parts and performed so well in such a variety of roles that it was extremely difficult to fix the final two casts, which will be affectionately named - 'Tweedledee' and 'Tweedledum' casts. We hope that you will invite as many friends and family as possible to ensure that we have a full house for each of our two performances and offer as much support as we can for our excellent young performers.

#### **Spellbound**

We operate a scheme of spelling at Fairholme which runs progressively from Form I through to Form VII, focussing on the high frequency words in the early years and building up to a comprehensive and challenging vocabulary by the time the children reach the top of the school.

The spellbinding success of the scheme is well illustrated by the latest standardised test results. The graph above shows Form VII (year 6) group spelling performance compared with national overall performance. At each spelling level, Fairholme pupils out-perform the national average and the extent to which this happens increases as the spelling levels become harder. At the hardest level tested, our pupils performance is more than twice the national average (80% achieved against 37%). Keep working on those spellings everyone — some fantastic results this year!
