

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Building Works

Another significant step in our development programme for Fairholme will be taken over the Easter break, with the commencement of our construction and renovation works. This includes construction of four classrooms, extension of Form II to provide a dining and craft facility and creation of a new girls' toilet and washroom. The classrooms will be completed by September, while the toilets will be ready by next term.

Forms I and Kindergarten will be moved temporarily for next term prior to being rehoused in the new accommodation. We are delighted that the works are being carried out in partnership with firms closely connected with the school, Anwyl Construction, John Williams Home Improvements, Harrison Jones Bathrooms and Parry Davies Architects.

Following on from our developments of ICT/library suite and sports pitch, along with the boys' toilet improvements, the new works will significantly enhance the quality of our facilities at Fairholme.

World Maths Day

World Maths Day was certainly one of this term's highlights. It is an online mathematics competition for children of all ages, designed to improve mental maths skills. 1,298,834 students and 22,785 schools from 212 countries took part this year.

As well as improving maths skills, it was exciting for the children to see which countries children came from in each game they played.

Many of our pupils won the Platinum Certificate, awarded for playing 60 games or more and some

remarkably high scores were achieved in each class

Each child is registered for 'mathletics', our webbased maths software, which enables everyone to practise their maths skills either at school or at home. Children can work through the entire maths curriculum for their year group and we are checking who is doing this!
