### Party in the Street



### Intranet Club

Following the success of the Radio Club last year, Alex is back implementing an Intranet for the input and reporting of house points at school. The children are actively engaged in setting up this system and inputting the data. The system provides reports on points scored by individuals, classes and houses. A feature the children particularly enjoy is the leader board (akin to various popular TV shows), showing who is ahead on points each week. Not only is this great fun, it is also developing the children's ICT skills and interest in and ownership of the House system at school. The system can next be expanded to include a pupil's blog and a communication with teachers tool.



We have recently invested in a number of Android Tablets to provide another dimension for our ICT. The teachers are now busy trying out these and evaluating the many educational apps available.

So far we have discovered many and diverse uses for the tablets. In our enrichment clubs, the children have been using the camera and note taking facilities in 'Roving Reporters' and also learning to play chess against the tablet and each other in Chess Club.

In the classrooms, the tablets have proved useful in developing phonic skills, have been used for drawing, counting money, learning about time and practising times tables.

The children have, of course, taken to this new technology like ducks to water!
